BOARD MEETING SUMMARY

(October 19, 2013)

GVR Update

(Ron Sills)

These are busy times at GVR, especially working as a "shrunken" board. Recall that 5 board members resigned on 9/11, leaving us with just 7 members. By policy, Ron Woodrow, who participated unsuccessfully in the last election automatically ascended to the Board, but 4 positions remain open. We have 12 candidates for those slots, and we are going through the process to fill the open seats within 3 weeks. In the interim, the 7 present members have a much larger workload.

We have an active search committee working diligently to fill the executive director position, which we are on track to fill by Thanksgiving. We have had some excellent candidates, so I am very optimistic that we will have a strong leader in place soon, who can help lead us progressively forward. We plan a session where members will be able to meet the finalists for the position, and this is planned for November 13th. I encourage you to meet these final candidates.

Another critical decision is at hand for the Board, and that is the budget for 2014. I serve on Fiscal Affairs and as the only board holdover from before the resignations, I have had a great deal of influence on the finalization of the budget. GVR is in a financial hole. Dues increases have nowhere nearly kept pace with the rise in operations costs. Past boards have

allowed this to happen. Specifically, costs have risen at a 4.4% rate over the past 5 years, while dues increases have risen only 1.6%. At the same time, our facilities have aged to the point where they are beginning to require more maintenance. In fact, 70% of our buildings are over 30 years old. In the past, the town was continuing to be built and our membership rolls grew rapidly. Now that development has greatly slowed, our membership numbers are increasing only slowly. So, as our costs continue to accelerate, we cannot absorb these costs with dues paying membership growth.

After rounds of budget proposal cuts, the Board considered several alternatives representing packages of various cuts and dues increases. It was decided to raise the dues \$19 to \$440. This still resulted in large scale budget cuts, and represents a 4.5% increase. On a monthly basis, the dues would rise from \$35.08 a month to \$36.70 a month, hardly a budget buster, but still larger than past years. The Board felt it is finally time to face the realities rather than pass the inadequate funding problems down the road, as has been done in the past.

On October 22, the full board brought this recommended budget to a vote. The board supported the proposal by a 6 -2 vote, but it failed because policy requires the budget to receive 7 votes in order to pass. With only 8 board members at present, it was easy for one member to essentially veto the proposal.

I felt that considering the realities we face, that this proposal was very conservative indeed. We did the math, and had we simply raised dues consistent with the Consumer Price Index increases over the past 6 years, dues THIS YEAR would have been \$460 instead of the \$421 we paid. This in itself portrays the problem. I was disappointed in the result.

By policy, our dues notices must go out to members in early December, so it is fairly imperative that we approve a budget in a timely manner. We cannot be Congress. What I think will happen is that we will seat new board members soon, and we will get the one vote we need to enact the proposed budget that failed on October 22. This is urgently needed for the fiscal well being of GVR. I am hopeful. By any measure, GVR remains a tremendous bargain for our members. It costs barely more than a morning newspaper each day.

Please Help!

Pigeons are a problem here in the Springs. Pigeons are year-round nesters, and considered the number one pest bird in the country. Due to their instinct to stay close to their birth-site and multiple offspring per year, a flock will grow quickly in size. The rooftops on our homes have become their favorite spot for "hanging out".

Please consider resolving this issue in a humane manner by removing or not filling your bird feeders.

Time Flies...(Do I Need a Facelift)

We all know that aging is a natural phenomenon, one that many of us embrace gracefully. We exercise, eat healthy, slather on moisturizing sunscreen, learn new hobbies, socialize, and perhaps get a little help from our physician friends. Remember today's 70 is yesterday's 50!

It's hard to believe, but our lovely Springs neighborhood is aging as well. The voungest homes are now 9-10 years old, and many were built more than 15 years ago. While there are few complaints about our weather, the Arizona sun is not kind to our homes. In order to maintain the quality of your home and the Springs overall, exterior maintenance must be done on the stucco, wood, and roof. Valuable information on this topic is located on the Springs website thespringshoa.org. Just go to the website, click on Architectural Review (on the left side of the page), and then click on **Paint Suppliers**. This will bring up a document containing HOA approved formulas and suppliers for paint and stain, FAQ's to ask potential contractors, and a list of contractors who have done work in the Springs in the past. Please remember that only HOA approved paints and stains may be used and it is the homeowners' responsibility to insure the contractor has the correct formula/supplier. Another great source for information on the care of Arizona homes (interior/exterior) can be found on the rosieonthehouse.com website. While we can't stop aging, we can certainly insure that homes in our neighborhood age as gracefully as we do. Wouldn't it be great if real estate agents described the Springs as a vibrant, well

maintained, increasing property value community!?!?!

Volunteer Corner

Both of these Springs volunteer committees are led by Barbara Coggins. 
