- The Board will no longer put parking notices on cars incorrectly parked on the street or sidewalks.
- The Green Valley Hospital will be taking over the road cleanup which was assigned to the Springs homeowners.

Favorite Recipe from the Potluck

CHOCOLATE TRIFLE

(Dorothy Maus)

1 (9.8 oz) package fudge brownie mix

½ cup Kahlua

1 (3.9 oz) package instant chocolate pudding mix

1 (12 oz) frozen whipped topping, thawed

6 (1.4 oz) English Toffee – flavored candy bars crushed (or heath bars)

Prepare brownie mix and bake according to package directions in a 13 x 9 x 2 inch pan. Prick top of warm brownies at 1 inch intervals. Using a fork, drizzle with Kahlua. Let cool and crumble.

Prepare pudding mix according to package directions, omitting chilling. Place 1/3 of crumbled brownies in bottom of a 3 quart trifle dish. Top with one third of pudding, whipped topping and crushed candy bars. Continue 1/3 and 1/3 forming 3 layers. Chill.

(Kahlua — depending on crowd I have eliminated the Kahlua or used up to a full cup.)

Where Have You Been??

Recently I traveled to Phoenix to see the The **Musical Instrument Museum (MIM)**. GVR usually does one of these bus trips in the fall, but I missed out so I signed up for Alan Kruse's bus tour of the Wrigley Mansion and Musical Instrument Museum. Both tours were interesting but the MIM was outstanding. Both tours were docent led which is the best way to do a tour in my opinion. You don't have to be part of a tour group, you can venture there on your own if you don't mind the drive to Phoenix.



The Musical Instrument Museum was opened in April 2010, it is the largest museum of its type in the world. The collection of over 15,000 musical instruments and associated objects includes examples from nearly 200 countries and territories, representing every inhabited continent. Some larger countries such as India, China, Russia, the United States and Brazil have multiple displays with subsections for different types of ethnic, folk, and tribal music.

The Museum was founded by Robert J. Ulrich, former CEO and chairman of Target Corporation. An avid collector of African art and a world museum enthusiast, Ulrich and his friend, Mr. Felix, originated the idea after a visit to the Instrument Museum in Brussels, Belgium. The contemporary building covers approximately 200,000 square-feet, with two floors of light-filled galleries. Built at a cost of over \$250 million.

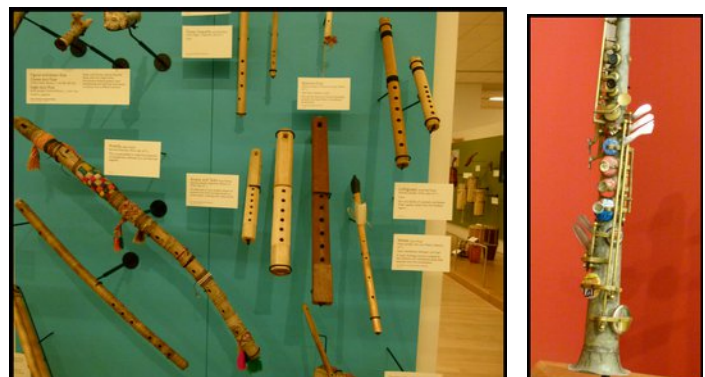
If you are interested in music or geography or ethnography, this is an amazing place. Thousands of instruments are grouped by region and country (Africa & Middle East, Asia, Europe, Latin America, and US) It is amazing how such a massive collection of instruments, dating back to the 1800s could have been acquired.

Each Continent has its own room. In each room are several enclosed and open exhibits. Each item is titled with a description and the area

from which that item originated. There are geographical maps helpful in locating the country. Guests are given head sets with a monitor. With the monitor we could enjoy the sound of most of the instruments. At each exhibit there is a little lettered plaque allowing you to know which video is being shown. To start the video sound, make sure your monitor is near the music icon in the lower right hand corner of that plaque.



Admission is \$20 per adult. The monitor/headset is included. You might want to check out their website <http://mim.org/visit/plan-your-visit> There is a restaurant at the facility--Cafe Allegro, open from 11-2. (Article submitted by Eileen Owen)

Residents of the Month

Oliver and Marjorie Fezler

Marjorie's motto is that "Life is a mystery" and the Fezler's are trying their hardest to solve the mystery.



Marjorie grew up in Indiana and Oliver in Minnesota. In the Second World War Oliver served on a navy carrier. Oliver was on the last ship to be bombed by a Kamikaze pilot. The ship made it to Guam and was repaired. Marjorie served in the US Cadet Nurse Corp. This was set up by President Franklin to train nurses for the U.S. during WWII.

They met due to an accident. Oliver was flying a passenger in the mountainous area near Hayward, California. A downdraft caught the plane and took it into the trees where the wings and tail were torn off and Oliver performed a forced landing. His passenger only had bumps and bruises but as Oliver crawled from the plane he realized his arm was broken. They were about 2 1/2 miles from the highway so they hiked out and hitchhiked to a hospital in Hayward where they set his arm. While in the hospital the cast on his arm had shed "crumbs of plaster" onto the bed. Oliver called for a nurse to fix the problem and Marjorie answered that call. Marjorie was working nights at the hospital while she was studying for her master's degree at Stanford. Three months after meeting they were married. They have celebrated their 66th wedding anniversary. Marjorie said she never did complete her master's degree.

After the Navy Oliver attended college and got his Aeronautics engineering degree. Oliver went to Kansas to pick up a car Marjorie's uncle had helped them attain. While traveling through Kansas he stopped at Boeing and applied for a job. Boeing told him to come back in a week and they would probably have a job for him. Oliver returned to California and then he and Marjorie went back to Wichita, Kansas. During the years with Boeing Oliver worked on many projects but some of the more notable are the Apollo Program and the Helicopter Program during the Vietnam War. These jobs took them to Shreveport and New Orleans, Louisiana and Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Marjorie left her nursing career for a few years while their son and two daughters were young but she did return to it later. She taught nursing, mostly in pediatrics.

After taking an early retirement the Fezler's bought a 25 acre resort in Arkansas. They had horses, walking trails and a lot of work. They made a conscious decision to keep learning during their retirement years. They certainly have done that. They have hiked with back packs the entire 2,136 trail miles of the Appalachian Trail. They slept many nights in sleeping huts which had been installed by the CCC core. These huts were roofed with a sleeping platform a few feet off of the ground and they were enclosed on three sides. These shelters slept 5 people with your head toward the open end. The hike took six months.

The Fezler's have traveled extensively by many modes of travel. Such as hiking, canoeing, river rafting, motor cycling, by train, boat, auto, bus, horses, skis, pulling a fifth wheeler and trekking, riding elephants while in Thailand on a trek looking for tigers and riding camels in Egypt to the explore the Pyramids. They have climbed Mt Kilimanjaro in Tanzania, climbed the mountains in Nepal, been on safaris in Africa, traveled Russia, Finland, Sweden, Norway, most of Europe, the middle east the far east and central and south American, Canada, Mexico, Australia, China, Egypt, Israel, Turkey, the Polynesian triangle, around the Cape of South America, all of the states in the United States, all of the National Parks & Monuments, participating in elder hostels programs which included a wagon train trip in the Black Hills and a week of dog sledding out of Vermillion College in MN, the Sturgis Motor Cycle Rally, and many other areas of interest. They love the outdoors and love learning. When asked for a favorite

place they have traveled they said the people they meet is what makes each area special. For Marjorie she favors the gentle people of Nepal, for Oliver it is the people of rural China.

When asked how they decided on Green Valley it seemed a bit of a lucky happenstance. They knew they wanted warm, dry weather so they focused on Arizona, New Mexico, and Texas. In 2003, while traveling down Interstate 19, they pulled their 5th wheeler off the road at Esperanza and stopped for lunch. While eating they saw a Coldwell real estate office nearby. They stopped in and talked to Hank the 80 year old agent. He showed them a small villa they were not interested in then he mentioned he had a client who had not listed their home yet but he made arrangements for it to be seen by the Fezler's. It was perfect. The HOA potlucks, the computer club, the pool facilities have made it a great home for them.

They have 7 grandchildren and 8 great grand children and are into the texting and getting pictures on their I-Phone. The children keep them up to date on technology. That is all part of the learning process which keeps them young at heart, in spirit, and ready for their next adventure.

This is just the tip of the iceberg into all the activities the Fezler's have done and are doing. They are a great example of keep on going strong for as long as you can and keep on learning.
